

City/County






ENGAGEMENT & REGIONAL COLLABORATION



Which sectors would you like to see more engaged in resilience planning and implementation?






Building Regional Disaster Resilience




Top 3 Natural Hazard Concerns






Which critical socioeconomic issues is your jurisdiction facing?

FINANCING

- It's time to diversify the 4C community's resilience project funding sources; the respondents are heavily dependent on federal funding for resilience projects.
 - 71 % respondents use external grants as their main finance source
- There is a opportunity to develop **self-reliant funding sources** for resilience in the Central Coast through local or regional ballot measures to provide voter approval for special taxes or general obligation bonds.
 - Of those responding, only one "yes' came in on use of this type of resource



FINANCING

- The potential to develop joint partnership funding proposals is very strong
 - 83% responded that they would work on jointly funded projects.
- Another promising avenue of resilience funding is the **re-purposing of existing** general fund, capital improvement monies, and other internal allocations for resilience implementation.
 - 46% of respondents hadn't tapped internal organizational/agency funds for this purpose
