ARCCA COMMITMENTS TO RACIAL JUSTICE

Over the past three months, we have witnessed a historical convergence of a worldwide pandemic, a major economic recession, and extensive social injustices in Black and Indigenous communities throughout California and beyond.

We at ARCCA stand in solidarity with Black and Indigenous communities fighting for justice.

We understand that we cannot achieve climate justice without racial and social equity. We acknowledge the broader context of climate change and its direct ties to systemic inequity, with racial inequality at the forefront. The systems of power that have allowed for the current climate crisis are the same systems that have upheld institutionalized racism.

In this time of unlearning and dismantling white supremacy in the climate movement, we aim to position ourselves as an ally in the fight for racial social equity. We will actively work to amplify Black and Indigenous voices and support climate justice advocates working to dismantle the systematic disenfranchisement of Black communities and Indigenous peoples. We will leverage our position as a statewide convener of over 2,000 climate professionals to increase our individual and collective awareness of privilege and race in the context of climate change - to then catalyze action towards an equitable, climate-resilient future.

We commit to taking the following steps as a starting point:

- Integrate Just Transition principles, processes, and practices into [ARCCA's Guiding Principles for Adaptation and Collaboration](#).
- Review and update ARCCA's governance structure to ensure racially equitable and inclusive decision-making while diversifying our leadership team and membership.
- Center our upcoming member meeting on racial equity and addressing institutionalized racism in the climate adaptation field.
- Work with our member regional collaboratives to support their own efforts to address racial equity issues.
- Strengthen our capacity to ensure equity in all forms through increased listening, education, and inclusion.

Tribal Band Youth Voice Solidarity with their Black Relatives

"Our elders taught us that the first step toward healing is telling the truth. As youth members of the Amah Mutsun Tribal Band, we uplift the many voices and leaders of the Black Lives Matter movement and their efforts to heal and bring justice for the many Black people who are assaulted or killed by police.

We pledge to educate ourselves about the systems and structures which maintain and promote the ongoing oppression of Black communities. With this knowledge, we are responsible to make others aware of the white supremacy and systemic racism to which Black people have been subjected since America's inception. We demand justice for the murders of Breonna Taylor, George Floyd, Rayshard Brooks, and many more members of the Black community.

As protectors of Popelouchum (our Amah Mutsun homeland in the greater Monterey Bay region) and Mother Earth, we will fight for racial equity and against anti-Blackness in our ancestral homelands and within our own communities. We too continue to experience the harmful impacts of ongoing legacies of colonization, and we will work to eliminate structural racism and marginalization affecting communities of color living in our traditional territory. We believe that people of color are stronger united in our struggles against white supremacy, patriarchy, coloniality, and systemic racism - all of which persistently seek to divide and conquer us.

We are grateful to the Black community for taking steps toward collective healing, and we recognize that there are many more steps to go. We believe that for healing to occur, the leadership and voices of the communities most impacted by oppressive systems must be at the forefront. Our culture directs us to bring balance to our lands, and without eradicating systemic racism, we cannot have balance. At every step of this shared journey, the Amah Mutsun Youth pledge to stand in solidarity with the Black Lives Matter movement and our Black and Black-Indigenous relatives.
